Objective: To delve into the themes, characters, and unique style of

- **Target Age Group:** High school or undergraduate students studying literature, aged 16-22.
- **Total Estimated Duration:** Approximately 90 minutes

Materials

- Copies of "Nightsongs" or selected passages
- Whiteboard or flip chart
- Markers
- Sticky notes

Activity Steps:

Participant Evaluation Rubric

Evaluation is vital in assessing participant performance in our exploration of Jon Fosse's "Nightsongs." Through comprehensive rubrics, we aim to provide objective feedback on role play, concept mapping, and reflective responses. These rubrics ensure consistency and clarity in assessing participants' engagement, comprehension, and reflective insights throughout the activity, fostering continuous improvement in literary analysis skills.

Roleplay Assessment Rubric

Criteria: Role portrayal, Engagement with dialogue, Adherence to scene context

Score:

Excellent: Demonstrates a deep understanding of the character, actively engages in dialogue, and consistently maintains the context of the scene.

Good: Portrays the character effectively, participates in dialogue with some engagement, and generally maintains the context of the scene.

Fair: Displays some understanding of the character, contributes to dialogue with limited engagement, and occasionally loses context within the scene.

Poor: Shows minimal understanding of the character, lacks engagement in dialogue, and frequently deviates from the context of the scene.

Concept Mapping Assessment Rubric

Criteria: Clarity of organisation, Accuracy of content representation, Depth of analysis

Score:

Excellent: Concept map is well-organised, accurately represents content, and provides in-depth analysis of themes, characters, and key elements.

Good: Concept map is mostly clear in organisation, accurately represents content, and offers some analysis of themes, characters, and key elements.

Fair: Concept map is somewhat organised, partially accurate in content representation, and provides limited analysis of themes, characters, and key elements.

Poor: Concept map lacks clarity in organisation, inaccurately represents content, and offers minimal analysis of themes, characters, and key elements.

Reflective Response Grading Rubric

Criteria: Depth of insight, Integration of learning outcomes, Clarity of expression

Score:

Excellent: Reflective response demonstrates deep insight into learning experiences, effectively integrates learning outcomes, and communicates ideas clearly and concisely.

Good: Reflective response shows understanding of learning experiences, integrates learning outcomes to some extent, and communicates ideas with clarity.

Fair: Reflective response displays limited insight into learning experiences, inconsistently integrates learning outcomes, and communicates ideas with some clarity.

Poor: Reflective response lacks insight into learning experiences, fails to integrate learning outcomes, and communicates ideas with poor clarity.

These rubrics provide clear criteria for assessing participants' performance in the role play, concept mapping, and reflective response components of the activity, allowing for consistent and meaningful evaluation.
